There is huge excitement in the sporting community in St. Patrick's secondary school. A U17 soccer team has been invited to an International soccer event called the World School Games (WCG). On the back of these consistent performances across a number of age grades, St. Pat's has been chosen to take on schools from all over the world in Barcelona this coming October. "The World School Games is the jewel in the crown of the international school sports calendar," said Scott McFarlan, director of World School Games.

"Since its inaugural event in 2018, the WSG series now sees over 200 schools from every corner of the world compete in a range of events in the world's best facilities," said Mr. McFarlan.

"It is a brilliant opportunity for our students and players going up against schools from other countries. They will get to test themselves against the different styles of play from other countries and we are looking forward to the challenge," said team coach Kevin Fitzgerald.

"Soccer is a really thriving sport in the school so we are delighted that students of St Pats are being rewarded with such an honour. "Sharing an experience like this with their friends while also competing in a sport they enjoy is massive for lads of their

age. It will stand to them in the future and give them great memories to look back on," said Mr. Fitzgerald.

Rugby:

The U16 Rugby team topped off an incredible year of sporting success in St. Patrick's Secondary School by winning the 'Giles Shield' in Musgrave Park on the 8th of May. This competition was named in honour of Tralee man Gary Giles. St. Patrick's played St. Clements of Limerick in the final. St. Patrick's got off to a great start scoring 2 tries in the opening 18 minutes courtesy of Daniel McCarthy and Shane Kelliher with Michael Horan scoring the conversations. St Clements had a fight back in the middle of the first half leaving it a one score game on 14-12 to St. Pats after 24 minutes. St. Pats f inished the half much stronger with tries from Michael Horan and Rory O' Connor leaving the score 26-12 at the half time whistle.

St. Pats continued the momentum from the first half and added another try from Danny Hickey and a penalty to leave the final score St. Pats 36 - St. Clements 17. An impressive win for the team who lead the game from start to finish. Well done to players and coaches Mr. O Sullivan and Mr. Griffin on the success.

TRANSITION YEAR



The Transition Year class of 2023 had a wide range of learning experiences in class as well as a number of different trips outside the classroom. In Transition Year we strive to blend classroom learning with hands on learning. This was very evident with the class trip Tys' took to France during the Easter holidays. Below is a written piece by 2 TY students on the trip to France.

Mon voyage en France – Written by Evan Nash and Killian Butler

At the beginning of this year, our year head told us about a class trip to France during Easter. In preparation for this trip, we looked at places we would be visiting as well as historical monuments from those areas during French class.

On the first day of the trip, we had to get up early around 2am to catch the bus to Dublin Airport for our flight at 8.50am. We landed in Paris at around 11.30a.m. Once we arrived in Paris airport, we took a private bus from the airport to the capital. Then, once we arrived, we visited the city and saw famous places, such as the Eiffel Tower. We then stopped at our first historical site, the Chateau de Versailles building, which inside showed famous French paintings, statues and the glass room. The building had a huge courtyard with a water fountain and a large grass field running from the building to the entrance. We stayed in a youth hostel for the first and only night in Paris before going to Cherbourg.

On day 2 we visited the famous Louvre, we saw some of the most famous paintings in France. We stopped at our hotel and then on day 3, headed to a French school located in the city named 'Lycée Victor Grignard'. We were able to see what it was like in French school, how each subject is learned and how it is spoken. We were learning similar subjects that we learn at home in Ireland, but it is harder to understand more when it is in French.

For the last 5 days, we were in Cherbourg, we travelled to many places in the city, such as the La cite de la Men, which included a memorial and experience of the Titanic, as well as an aquarium, a range of submarines used for deep water travel, and a visit to a ship used during World War 2. The final location we visited was Sáinté Mére Eglise and Batterie d'Azeville, wherethe famous WW2 gun trenches were used by French soldiers and others fighting alongside them during WW2. We were able to see inside the trenches. and once we were done, we took the bus back to our hotel, where we stayed one night. The last day we travelled home by ferry, we took the Cherbourg to Rosslare ferry, which took us up to 15 hours in total to return.

Overall, we thought the trip was very enjoyable and very interesting as we got to learn the subject better and be able to visit some of France's most historical places. A highlight for us was the boat tour across the city of Paris and visiting the Louvre.

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














STUDENTS' VOICE

Subject under the spotlight: Graphics

What does a typical class look like?

In a graphics class we will be taught a new drawing technique such as orthographic projection, pictorial, drawing conics and will then do drawing questions in the book about it and find examples of it outside the classroom.



Favourite activity you have completed in class so far?

We recently did a desk tidy project where we designed a model on Onshape a CAD software. Afterwards we were able to print out our design using the schools 3d printer or laser cutter.

What new skills have you learnt since you started studying this subject?

So far I have learned conics, polygons, isometric drawing, orthographic projection, constructions, transformation geometry and sketching. We were also taught how to use Onshape and modelling using card.

Subject under the spotlight: Physics

Our year was one of the first years to have Physics as a subject choice, There is only 5 in our class but we all enjoy the subject.

What does a typical class look like?

There is not necessarily a typical class but usually we are either doing theory, experiments or calculations, On average we do one experiment per week. This year we



have covered Mechanics, Heat, Light and Sound. The calculation we do our very interesting also for example on our summer test we had o calculate the speed, time taken, and force of a cricket ball after being struck by a bat.

Favourite activity you have completed in class so far?

My favourite thing we have done in class in mechanics. Mechanics is basically the maths behind every day objects it is a mixture of theory, experiment and calculation. It is really interesting seeing the equations you study happen before your eyes.








WEBSITE UPDATE — SENIOR CYLE SUBJECTS
